The Solidarity Officer will not contact agencies or individuals on the student's behalf. They will, however, provide students with resources that may be available for the situation they are experiencing. An important component of this position is confidentiality. Students are assured no records of their grievances will be maintained by the GSA and are ensured no personal information is disclosed. The Solidarity Officer also serves as a communication channel between the GSA and UAW 2865. I look forward to working with all graduate students and professional students to connect them to available resources.

Addressing racism. One of the GSA's goals is to take meaningful action towards addressing institutional and structural racism. To this end, we worked with the UC Merced Library to provide digital copies of several books addressing issues of anti-Blackness, racism, discrimination, and injustice in America. We have been advocating, both at UC Merced and at the system-wide level, for graduate students to receive stipends for work done on committees for equity, diversity, and inclusion. These efforts have been successful, and for the first time, all members on the Graduate Dean's Advisory Council on Diversity will receive stipends this year. In Spring, we hope to offer diversity training for the graduate community.

Mental health care. Another focus of the GSA is to improve mental health care on campus. Graduate students at UC Merced need a more racially diverse staff providing mental health services. We will be pushing for the university to hire a Black counselor on campus who understands the burden of prejudice and can specifically address the needs of Black graduate students.

Professional development during the

pandemic. In our efforts to help graduate students keep up with professional development during the pandemic, the GSA has been working with the Center for Engaged Teaching and Learning (CETL) to support Teaching Assistants with planning and organizing instruction for an online learning environment. We have been assisting CETL with managing the TA Support Network, a platform for grad students to exchange ideas and discuss issues that matter to students' development as a teacher. For the Spring, we are planning to develop a series of interactive workshops.

Finally, I and other GSA Executive Council members are actively working with and/or serving on the Valuing Black Lives at UC Merced Task Force, the Chancellor's Advisory Council on Campus Climate, Culture, and Inclusion, and the Graduate Dean's Advisory Council on Diversity. **Reminder:** Campus Based Fees, **\$168.50** are due January 13 at 4:00 PM!

As many of us know from firsthand experience, the UC Merced bus transportation system is clearly lacking across several features. From destinations that take over an hour to reach to riding shuttles instead of real buses, our transportation system could desperately use an upgrade. One of the GSA's goals is to start a conversation with TAPS on resolving these issues. We are currently in the works of drafting a letter listing the current problems with our current bus system, what changes we would like to see, and how these modifications will be executed. Luckily, Interim Vice Provost and Graduate Dean, Chris Kello is also passionate about working on the bus system and we plan to work together to tackle this issue. Our plan is to identify where graduate students live throughout the city of Merced and plan routes accordingly.

The Evolving role of the IVP Benny Nguyen [bnguyen255@] Internal Vice President



In the recent Fall 2020 GSA election and proceedings, several bylaws and constitutional amendments related to the Internal Vice President (IVP) were voted upon and passed. The IVP changes were two pronged: reduced involvement with the Delegate Assembly (DA) and expansion to new functions, particularly focusing on building relationships between the GSA and graduate student organizations. In the new conception, the IVP will attend DA meetings, assist the Delegate Chair (a position created by these same amendments), and continue to communicate between the Executive Council and DA. The second prong was recently added as the GSA communed about the needs of the student body; I hope to further establish this function in the coming semester.

Graduate student organizations are an enriching, vital component to our graduate community and are sites of important interdepartmental connection. The GSA is deeply invested in supporting these organizations, especially in light of distance and remote learning where opportunities to connect are more difficult. As IVP, I have and will continue to communicate with graduate student organizations about resources that can support their org.'s programming, efforts, and constituents in general. I hope to attend the meetings of these organizations so they can voice any concerns to the GSA directly and in confidence. These relationships will enable collaborations to offer better, more successful programming, thereby benefiting the graduate student body at large. Despite being in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic, young voter turnout has hit a record high as 10 million young voters (age 18-29) voted early in the 2020 election in the country. Merced county had 117,413 registered voters and 91,817 ballots cast representing a voter turnout of 78.20%. Our new elected City of Merced Mayor Matt Serratto will take office next month, you can review your local election results <u>here</u>.

Matt Serratto was one of the three candidates that interviewed with UC Merced students and had shared his views and mission, which include building community and bringing people together. If you missed those videos see the "Candidates and Conversations" from the Community Engagement Center.

The Economic Development Opportunity Fund that contributes directly to the On-Going Revitalization of Downtown Merced has meetings scheduled biweekly. This renovation project now boasts 114 boutique style hotel rooms, meeting space, and multiple dining options. These include the Capitan Hotel, Mainzer Theater, and the Tioga Apartment renovations. Furthermore, there is currently some discussion regarding usage of funds for a grant program to assist local businesses in these times.

Again, I would like to encourage you to join your local politics. The City of Merced encourages its citizens to take an active interest in matters pertaining to their community. GSA Travel Award. I would like to remind you about the GSA travel awards that you may qualify for. The GSA provides travel grants to offset the cost of attending conferences. We offer an award of \$400.00 maximum to aid 24 graduate students per academic year. Travel grants will be awarded in 4 cycles per year. The deadlines are February 1st, May 1st,

August 1st, and November 1st. You can visit our website or contact us for more information on when you should apply, and what the application looks like. We will also send emails about upcoming deadlines.

GSO & Sponsored Events Funds. Do you know that you can apply to get GSA fund for your event? This year we have allocated \$2,500 to fund graduate student organizations and \$1,500 for GSA sponsored events. 
